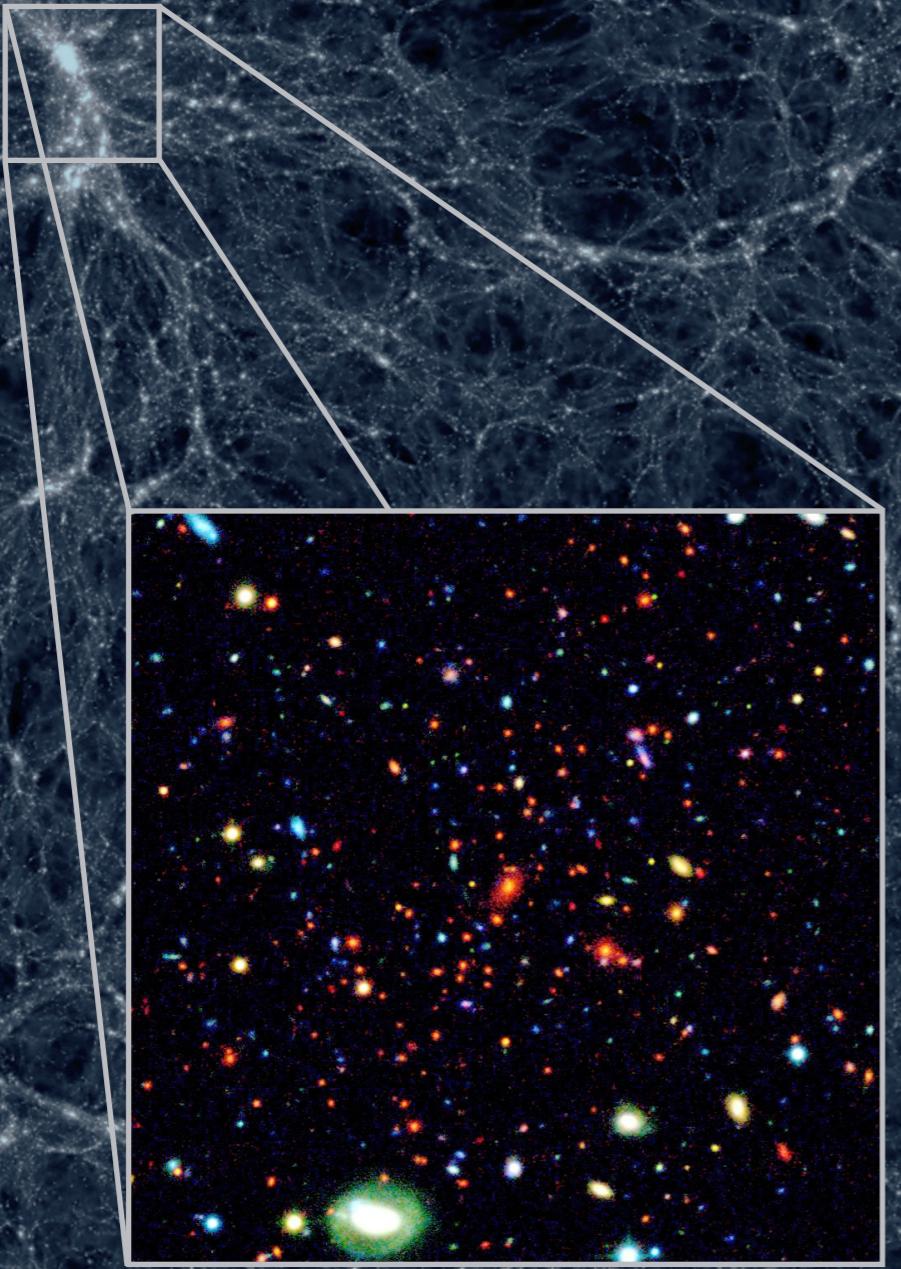


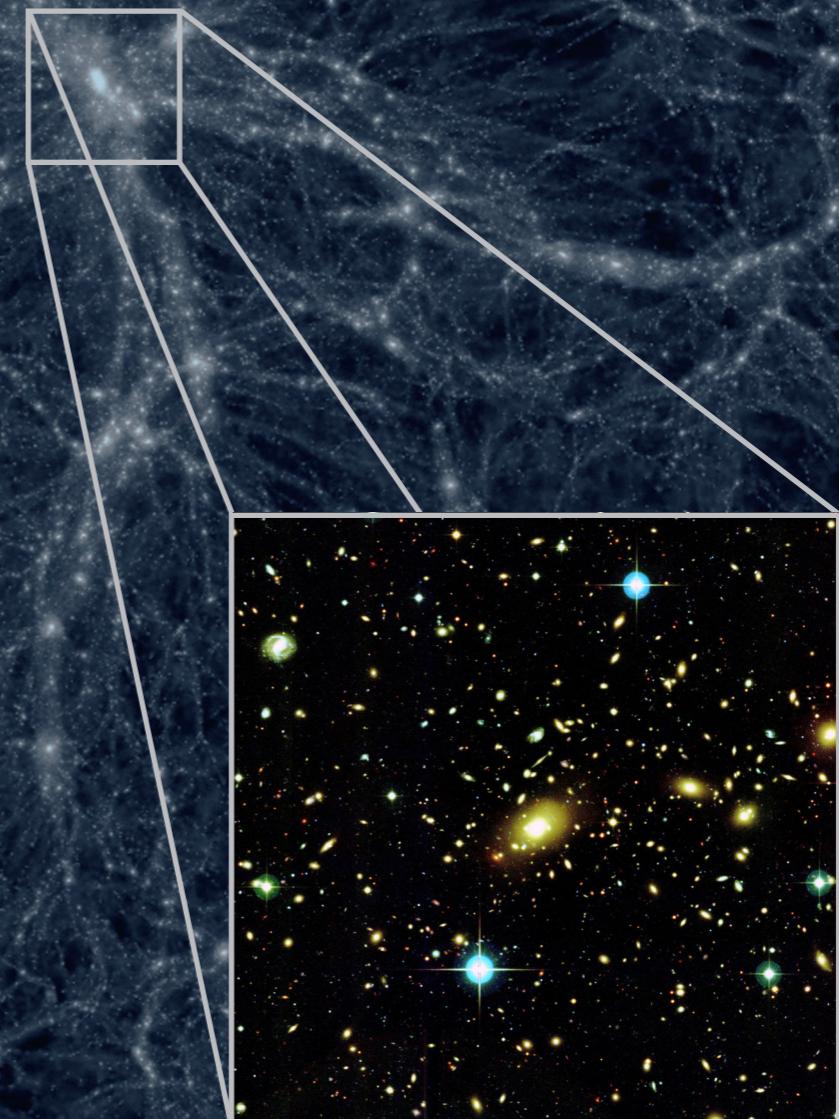
Understanding how galaxies form in our dark matter dominated Universe is a key goal of extragalactic astronomy. This thesis presents measurements of the distribution of stellar mass in galaxy clusters at redshift $z=1$ (back cover) and $z=0$ (front cover), providing constraints on the process of structure formation and the evolution of galaxies in high-density environments.
